Loving Your FIRST Neighbors

In Matthew 22:37-39 Jesus tells us what the greatest commandment is. "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself." It is one commandment split into two parts, loving God, and loving your neighbor. Many times, people focus on loving their neighbors next door, other times they focus on their neighbors across the country or across the world. One group of neighbors that can often get overlooked however is our very first neighbors, our families: brothers, sister, parents, and children.

God created the family at the beginning of creation with Adam and Eve and gave them the charge to create the rest of humanity by being fruitful and multiplying. In Exodus God shows how serious he takes being a part of a family as he gives the command to honor your father and mother within the Ten Commandments. In Deuteronomy God tells the Israelites how important it is for them to teach their children the commands of the Lord and how the Lord has loved and cared for them. The New Testament continually makes reference to how Christ has made a way for us to be adopted into the family of God and how we can be brothers with Christ and sons and daughters of the father. God clearly LOVES the family.

Yet how many times do we treat our family members poorly. We often say and do things to our family members that we would never think of doing to our friends and certainly not to strangers. Yet too often our family members get our worst behavior. This is NOT how God intended it. When Jesus calls on us to love our neighbors, we should first start with our family members. How can we love our neighbors outside our family when we treat our own family poorly?

Family is a gift from God. Our parents are the first people who cared for us. Our siblings are our first friends that have been with us from the beginning of our lives. Many times, friendships, even the strongest friendships, fade when separated by great distances. Yet our family is always our family, no matter how much distance separates us. We are to be there for them and love them through the highs and lows, just as they many times carry us when we need it.

Ezekiel, UFO's, and the Worsts of Times...

Without any doubt
Ezekiel, the prophetic
book of the Old
Testament, is one of the
most vivid, interesting,
and amazing books of
prophecy in the Old
Testament. Many people
believe that he was
describing UFO's. Which
was not likely since
UFO's like to disappear,
and Ezekiel talked about
the God who wanted to
be with us.

Ezekiel lived in one of the lowest times in Israel's history as people were led off as captives to Babylon after
Jerusalem and Judah
were overtaken. There
were other prophets
living at the time of
Ezekiel, especially
Jeremiah, Habakkuk,
and Obadiah. Ezekiel
himself was an exile
taken to Babylon.

This was a time when people refused to believe in God's word. Much like today's world, God was scorned and pushed aside. As Ezekiel liked to say, "Then they will know that I am the Lord". Far

too often we ignore the teaching and understandings of the Old Testament in modern Christianity.

In Ezekiel we learn
again about a truly holy
God. Imagine if God had
a fault or an
inconsistency! We
would have no god at
all. We would be at the
mercy of all the powers
and chaos of the
universe. But Ezekiel
speaks of God in the
greatest terms of
grandeur and
timelessness, God is
awesome!

I know it is summertime but let us join in a real study of one of the famous prophets that we hardly ever take time for. This study is open to everyone!

Financial Update for Christ Lutheran

Recently the congregation voted to move \$18,000 from savings to the general fund for the purpose of remodeling our bathrooms this August. There will be new tile floors, new counters, new touchless dispensers and faucets, new lights, mirrors, and ceilings. This leaves our current savings at \$101,000. Our offerings for May were \$17,048. Which is below our monthly average of \$23,000.
