This old Christmas carol was written in 1865 in Great Britain and set to the tune of "Greensleeves" in 1871. There is something about the tune of this song that struck me as a kid and the song has been one of my favorites ever since! It has been recorded and rerecorded by numerous artists over the years and as I have gotten older the song has continued to be a favorite, not just for the haunting tune, but for the question it asks ... What Child IS this? This is the question that is ALWAYS important for us to ask, not just during the Christmas and Advent season, but daily in our lives. Who and what is this child, Jesus, to me?

This Advent season we will be taking a closer look at that question and the implications of its answer. As we go through each week of the advent season, I hope you will see that the answer to the question is at the same time as simple as "Jesus" and yet so complex that we could spend a lifetime exploring it without exhausting all the answers. During the Sundays in Advent, we will see that the answer to the question "What Child is this?" includes...The one we've been looking for, The one who came to die, The one we need most, The one who is God in the flesh, and The one who reigns forever more.

Old Testament Books:

- **Genesis Exodus:** Bible stories of the first people God created. Easy reading.
- Leviticus Deuteronomy: Long lists of Old Testament moral, civil and ceremonial law. Very difficult reading.
- Joshua Job: Longer, more complicated stories of the Israelites (God's chosen people) and their "on again off again" relationship with following God. Moderately difficult reading.
- **Psalms Ecclesiastes:** Quick, general Biblical advice for godly living. Fairly easy reading.
- Isaiah Malachi: More stories of the Israelites (God's chosen people) and their "on again off again" relationship with following God with plenty of prophesy mixed in. Fairly difficult reading.

New Testament Books:

- Matthew John (Also known as the Gospels): Bible stories about Jesus's time on earth. Very easy reading.
- Acts: Bible stories about the early church. Very easy reading.
- Romans Jude: Letters from early Christians to the churches, encouraging and instructing them in their faith. Easy reading.
- **Revelation:** A vision of what the end times will be like. Difficult reading.

Clint & Judy Lueck's Journey

To all our Christ Lutheran Family, Thank You - for your love, your kindness, your support, your prayers. These past few months, our faith journey has been sorely tested and strengthened! We faced so much uncertainty, stress, pain, and isolation. God was with us every step of the way! Dear friends, if you ever doubted the power of prayer, we're here to tell you your prayers were hands-on POWERFUL!!! God was our navigator from day one – nothing short of remarkable and miraculous. We experienced daily how God's fingerprints were showing, too many to name. He made his presence known in some pretty significant ways. Here are a few of your prayers in action:

- Day one Lawrenceburg, Indiana: When transported to local hospital ER, Clint notices something on the wall – a crucifix! We were in a Christian hospital and there was a crucifix in Every room. Clint commented at the get-go "this gives me great comfort."
- The patient database used by this hospital was the same as used by his medical care in Minnesota. This allowed for all medical history to be accessed. Prayers answered!
- Day three: Clint was transferred to a larger regional hospital in

Kentucky, which was in the same group of hospitals. Again, a cross in every room!

- While in the ICU, we learned Clint had a C. Diff infection that if left untreated could be life threatening. It was determined he had this while still in MN (complication of cancer treatment). One wonders if Clint had not landed in the hospital how long this would have gone undetected! Prayers answered!
- God put people in our path at exactly the right moment. At this point, Clint had been intubated, sedated, and was in very critical condition. I was broken. The same day of transfer, Clint's son had an overnight flight to Cincinnati airport (10 minutes from hospital). He was able to be with me. Also, longtime friends who had been on their own road trip, 'happened' to be only two hours away and diverted to be with me. They stayed for 4 days until things were more stable with Clint and I could breathe again. Prayers answered!
- Fast forward 4 weeks to Clints scheduled release date from rehab. How do we get him home? I needed another pair of hands. It so 'happened' our road tripping friends were headed

back to MN and were in Ohio, just across the river. They diverted again, got transfer training along with me from rehab, and Clint rode in their larger, more comfortable car while I followed in my little compact car. Prayers answered!

Back home in Mn for the first time I was a bit anxious about caring for Clint on my own. I think God knew I needed a little more time and He 'arranged' a safe route for me to get that time. That first evening, Clint ended up back in the hospital. -He was medically stable but kept for observation. PT recommended transitional care, so we waited for 4 more days to find a bed. Nothing was available. But, 4 more days gave us the extra time for his strength and my readiness to bring him home, with home health services. Prayers answered!



Memorial Funds -Bell Project Update

The Bell Project 2023 is a two-year memorial project to raise dedicated memorial funds for a digital carillon system. The congregation approved the plan to support this project at the 2021 annual meeting. As of Dec. 1st we have received memorial gifts totaling \$5,945 with a goal of \$13,000 by November 30, 2023.
